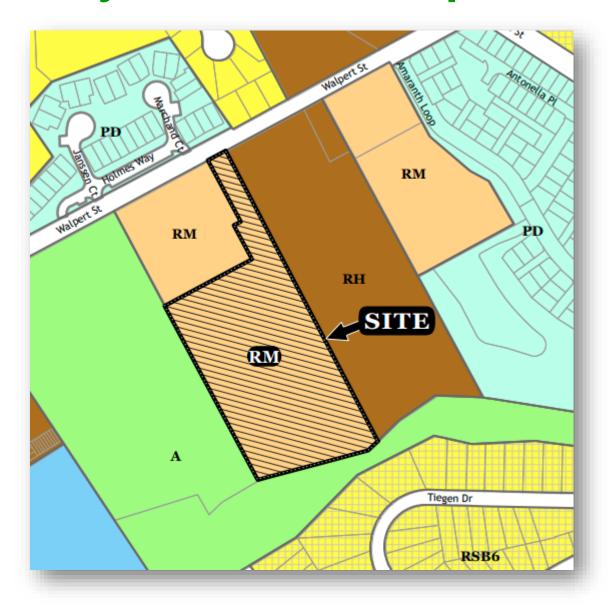

- Proposed Zoning: Medium Density Residential (RM)
- Current General Plan Land Use
 Designation: Medium Density Residential (MDR)

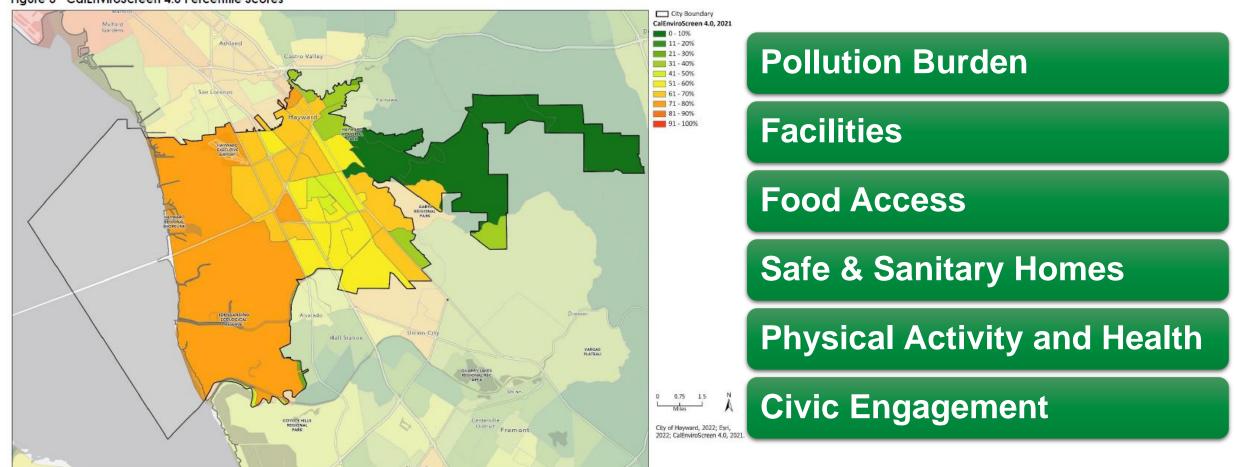

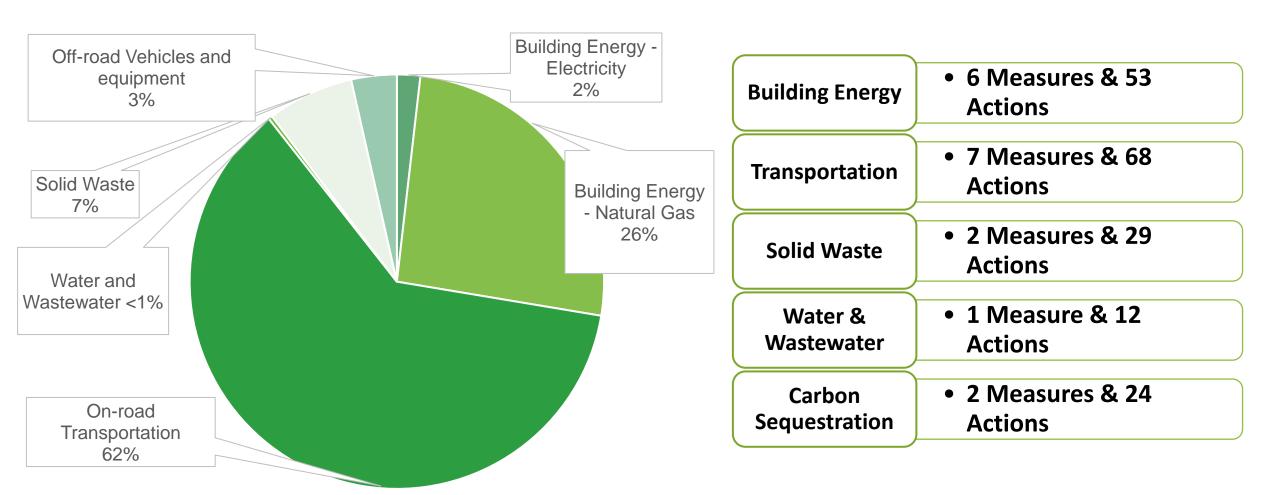

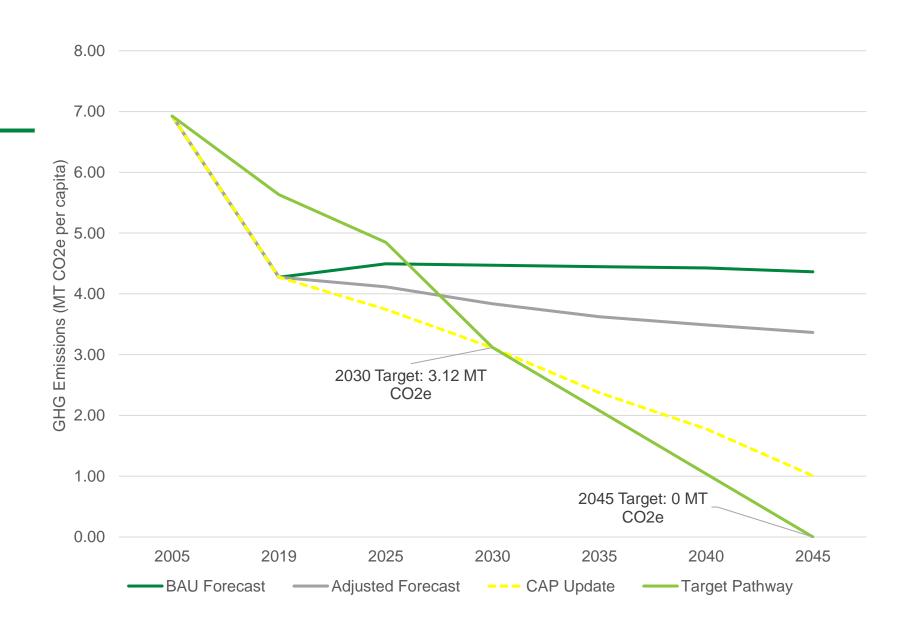

Hazards Element & Environmental Justice Element

- In July 2014, an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) was prepared for the Hayward 2040 General Plan.
- An Addendum to the EIR was prepared.

Fiscal Impact

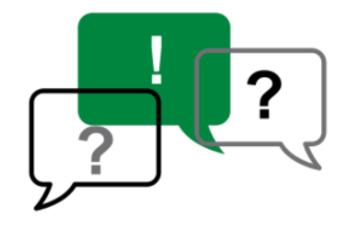
Implementation of the Climate Action Plan, Hazards Element & Environmental Justice Element will require significant resources

- 223 actions /programs are to be implemented by 2030
- 95 actions/programs are to be started by end of 2024
- Near term staffing needs:
 - Transportation: 3 4 new staff
 - Environmental Services: 2 new staff
 - Landscape Maintenance: 2 new staff

- Adopts resolutions approving amendments to the Hayward 2040 General Plan to incorporate the updated Climate Action Plan, updated Hazards Element, and new Environmental Justice Element

HOUSING EMERGENCY

Council Item LB 24-004: Resolution Declaring a State of Emergency on Homelessness & Temporarily Suspending Applicable Local Planning and Zoning Requirements



Homelessness is a Crisis

- Exposure to homelessness is traumatic
 - County-wide, in 2022 40% of those surveyed reported having at least one disabling condition
 - People who are homeless die earlier
- There were 381 individuals experiencing homelessness in Hayward in 2022
 - 70% were unsheltered

Efforts to Address Homelessness in Hayward

- ✓ October 2018 Adopted shelter crisis resolution
- ✓ November 2019 Opened Hayward Navigation Center
- ✓ January 2020 Adopted Strategic Roadmap with Preserve, Protect, and Produce Housing for All Priority Areas
- ✓ March 2020 Adopted workplan to incentivize housing production
- ✓ June 2021 Began HEART pilot program implementation
- ✓ July 2021 Adopted Let's House Hayward Strategic Plan and Federal Stimulus Expenditure Plan
- ✓ February 2023 Adopted temporary suspension of local planning and zoning requirements for homeless shelter providers on private property & Housing Element

BOS declaration unlocks additional tools in helping expedite a sufficient response to the crisis

- Having a corresponding local resolution better aligns us with the County to access these resources and implement local solutions, including:
 - More effective and efficient use of funds
 - Expanded availability of locations for service providers
 - Coordination with Alameda County on streamlining land use to support affordable housing and shelter
 - Ability to support the County in requesting resources from state and federal governments

Temporary Suspension of Planning and Zoning Requirements

Creates flexibility for the City and partners to increase shelter and service capacity to support those experiencing & at-risk of experiencing homelessness

Temporarily implements
planned Zoning Text
Amendments proposed in the
Housing Element

Allows Council to maintain minimum health and safety standards as well as oversight of operators while enabling efficient service provision
