

- All Current Vehicle Mounted ALPR Cameras are obsolete
- Averaged 1 million license plates reads per year


Body Worn Cameras (BWC)

ACLU Position

- □ Five principles
 □ License Plate readers may be used for law enforcement only
 □ Government must not store data about innocent people
 □ People should be able to find out if plate data of vehicles registered to them
 - ☐ LE Agencies should not share license plate reader data
 - ☐ Any entity that uses license plate readers should be required to report

Fiscal Impact

- 5 year contract agreement
 - \$157,103.51 per year

 - Request via HPD Yearly CIP Budget
 - Year 1 approved in FY 2020 Funds still available
 - Due to supply chain issues, implementation would be approx. 18 months

AB 481 Background for Council Meeting

- Went into effect January 1, 2022
- Legislation's intended purpose
 - Address transparency issues regarding funding, acquisition, and use of military equipment
- Legislation includes specific list of items
 - Deemed by lawmakers to be "military equipment"
- Codified in California Government Code Sections 7070 - 7075

Requirements

- Requires LE agencies to get approval from governing bodies to seek funding for, acquire, and use military equipment
 - Council must adopt an ordinance
 - Must initiate Council approval process by May 1, 2022 to continue using equipment
 - Council has 180 days to approve the ordinance after initiation of approval process

AB 481 Requirements

- Requires Council to consider proposed policy during open session of a regular meeting in accordance with the Brown Act
 - Must be an agenda item
 - Must allow for public comment
 - Must post proposed policy and equipment list on agency's website at least 30 days prior to any public hearing (posted April 11, 2022)

AB 481 Requirements

- Requires submission of an annual military equipment usage report to Council
 - Annual report for each piece of military equipment used in previous year must include:
 - Summary of use
 - Summary of complaints
 - Internal audit results
 - Total annual cost for each piece of equipment
 - Quantity of each piece of equipment
 - Agency intent to acquire additional equipment

AB 481 Requirements

- Requires HPD host a community engagement meeting
 - Public may discuss / ask questions regarding annual report
 - Must be done within 30 days of submission and public release of annual report
 - Must be well-publicized and conveniently located

Requirements

- Requires Council to review and approve ordinance annually
 - Renewal of ordinance by vote
 - Must determine compliance with ordinance for each military equipment item
 - Council can disapprove ordinance or require modifications to ensure compliance

AB 481 HPD Equipment List

- AB 481 specifically lists items deemed to be military equipment
 - 14 specific categories listed (1 generic category)
- HPD has some of the listed items in the inventory
 - These items have been in HPD's inventory for years in response to historic events
 - HPD is not asking for any new military equipment

AB 481 HPD Equipment List

What HPD has

- Tactical Robot and UAS (Category 1)
- Armored Personnel Carrier (Category 2)
- Command and Control Vehicle (Category 5)
- Breaching Slugs (Category 7)
- Specialized Firearms and Ammunition (Category 10)
- Noise Flash Diversionary Device (Category 12)
- Tear Gas and Pepper Spray (Category 12)
- Less Lethal Launchers and SIMS (Category 14)

AB 481 HPD Equipment List

What HPD does not have

- Humvees, trucks, or vehicles with breaching equipment (Category 3)
- Tracked Armored Vehicles (Category 4)
- Weaponized aircraft, vessels, or vehicles (Category
 6)
- Firearms of .50 caliber or greater (Category 8)
- Ammunition of .50 caliber or greater (Category 9)
- Firearms/accessories to launch explosive projectiles (Category 11)
- Taser Shockwave, microwave weapons, water cannons, or LRAD (Category 13)

Policy & Ordinance Development

- Extensive research for policy and ordinance development
 - Reviewed documents from other cities / counties in the region and across the State
 - Reviewed other related statutes
 - Community conversations and engagement events
 - Written community feedback

Policy & Ordinance Development

Community Engagement Efforts

- Created an informational page on the HPD's website with draft policy documents (4/11/22)
- Held a Council work session
- Held 2 virtual community meetings (5/26/22 and 6/6/22) – recorded and posted to website
- Held an in-person community engagement event where "military equipment" was displayed
- Created an informational video for the website

Policy & Ordinance Development

- Community Engagement Efforts (continued)
 - Spoke with the CAP during quarterly meeting
 - Accepted written feedback on policy documents and HPD's equipment inventory
 - Had numerous informal conversations with community members
 - Provided final draft documents to the CAP,
 Hayward Community Coalition, Hayward
 Concerned Citizens

Policy & Ordinance Development

Community Feedback

- Concerns regarding inclusion of CS ("tear gas") in HPD's inventory
- International Chemical Weapons Convention ban on use of Riot Control Agents in warfare
- Use of "military equipment" during protests/demonstrations
- HPD's equipment inventory volume and deployment model
- Authorization for the use of "military equipment"
- Exclusionary language/statute references in policy

Policy & Ordinance Development

Community Feedback (continued)

- Minimum requirements for when items can be deployed
 - Deployment vs. Use
 - Risk Assessment Matrix
 - Most of this equipment is only deployed when the Special Response Unit is activated
- Remove exigent circumstances from policy
 - Action needs to be taken immediately to prevent loss of life, escape, destruction of evidence, etc.
 - Must be room in policy for unanticipated events
 - Equipment exists the HPD does not have
 - Addition of equipment would require Council approval

Policy & Ordinance Development

Community Feedback (continued)

- Ban the use of chemical agents
 - · Variety of operational uses
 - No known reasonable alternative
 - Only deployed when the Special Response Unit is activated
 - Use is governed by other policies and State law
- Avenue for complaints other than HPD
 - Policy innovation project City complaint liaison
 - Community members can file complaints with City Hall/Human Resources/City Attorney's Office
 - Background research underway will return to Council with update on this project in Fall 2022

AB 481 Recommendations

- Recommend the removal of certain munitions from HPD's inventory – Stinger balls
 - Based on dialogue with community and concerns expressed
 - Based on a needs assessment and review of usage
 - Based on common ground shared between HPD and community regarding the indiscriminate nature of these munitions and potential for injury

AB 481 Recommendations

- Recommend the approval of the policy and introduction of the ordinance
 - HPD Policy 706
 - Re-written, amended, added sections highlighted in red
 - City of Hayward Ordinance
 - Approves HPD Policy 706
 - Consistent with cities/counties across the region and State

Recommended Changes

- Cost-of-Living Adjustments:
 - 3% effective the pay period including July 1, 2022
 - 5% effective the pay period including July 1, 2023
- Professional Development Reimbursement:
 - Increase from \$350 to \$500 for non-exempt staff
- Health & Wellness:
 - Expands benefit to lump sum reimbursements and purchase of home exercise equipment
- Overtime threshold to align with other non-exempt employees
 - Paid leave hours count toward 40 hours threshold in determining overtime eligibility
- Salary study to be completed by December 2023

Fiscal Impact: \$109,000

Terms

- One-time, lump sum payment equal to 4% of annual base pay:
 - Issued July 8, 2022
- Salary increase effective the pay period including January 1, 2023:
 - City Attorney 10% (>15% more below mid-market)
 - City Clerk 3% (5% but less than 10% behind mid-market)
 - City Manager 5% (10% but less than 15% behind mid-market)

Fiscal Impact:

- City Attorney Employment Agreement \$25,869
- City Clerk Employment Agreement \$9,259
- City Manager Employment Agreement \$22,307
