I missed the public comment section of today's City Council meeting but I would like to make a comment now.

The former golf course across from the private airport should be saved for open space and a public park. My understanding is that it is slated for building hangars for private planes as well as industrial buildings, There are plenty of empty industrial buildings in the area.

It has huge potential for open space, public parkland, children's playgrounds, and a par course for adults, There is a restaurant on the property that could be used for multicultural cooking classes and a cafe.

There are a number of important wildlife species on the property including Western pond turtles and Monarch butterflies.

According to the Quimby act, there should be three acres of park land per 1000 persons, and Hayward currently has far less than that.
