




Interactive Map of Services






Hayward Services Emergency Shelters


Transitional / Permanent Supportive Housing





Chronic Homelessness

<u>Definition</u>

- Experienced homelessness for a year or longer,
- OR who has experienced at least four episodes of homelessness in the last three years,
- AND has a disability

- 931 chronically homeless individuals
- 17% drop over 2 years, 27% drop over 10 years
- 22% of Alameda County's homeless population
- 82% are unsheltered



Veteran Homelessness

- 492 homeless veterans in Alameda County
- 11.5% of Alameda County's homeless population
- 50% are aged 51 or older
- 70% have substance abuse issues
- Operation Vets Home is a multiagency collaborative focused on rehousing veterans and providing wrap around services throughout Alameda County



Family Homelessness

- 462 homeless families with children
- 32% of Alameda County homeless population, down from 56% in 2003
- 753 children aged 17 or under, 106 unsheltered
- Abode will house 20 families utilizing Hayward's Emergency Solution Grant in 2015-2016



Single Adult Homelessness

- 2,912 single adult homeless individuals
- 15% are transitional aged youth (435)
- 6% increase in unsheltered homeless over 2 years
- 12% decrease in unsheltered over 10 years
- Rate of homelessness in Alameda County is equal to San Mateo and Marin Counties, despite having nearly double the poverty rate



"Hidden Homeless"


Definition

Individuals or families living temporarily with a friend or relative, in a motel or facing eviction within seven days.

- 168% increase in "hidden homeless" from 2003 to 2009 (1,134 to 3,042).
- Children are the most increased hidden homeless subpopulation
- Hidden homeless families have less than half the average monthly income as sheltered homeless, indicating a lack access to mainstream income support

San Rafael Downtown Streets Team

- Utilizes a "Work-First Model"
- 295 individuals housed
- 303 job placements
- 75% reduction in panhandling
- Positive results

Palo Alto Opportunity Center

- 88 units of permanent housing utilizing vouchers
- Supportive Services include:
 - case management
 - meals
 - medical/dental services
 - transportation services

Seattle, WA - Nyer Urness House

- Opened in 2013, housing for 80 individuals in one location
- Medical clinic on site
- 410% increase in EMS response in surrounding neighborhood
- 91% increase in police calls to surrounding neighborhood



Columbus, OH

- In April 2010, a centralized point of access for single homeless adults was opened, modeled on a facility
- In 2012 it switched to a phone based virtual diversion and shelter intake process due to encampments around the facility
- 2013 Community Shelter Board funding went mainly to supportive service and transitional housing. Less than 15% went to permanent supportive or rapid rehousing
- Columbus has seen an increase in homelessness since 2013 –
 79% increase in families, 11% increase in veterans



Santa Clara County

- Santa Clara County commissioned a comprehensive study of the taxpayer cost of homelessness
- The study cost \$200,000 and was funded by the county
- Home Not Found: The Cost of Homelessness in Silicon Valley was recently released and tracked more than 104,000 homeless from 2007 to 2012
- \$520 million annual cost to the county, 53% healthcare related
- Services to 2,800 individuals cost \$83,000 each per year
