1	Guadalupe Angulo	Lupe Angulo (she/her/ella) is a dedicated youth and community advocate with deep roots in public service. A graduate in Human Development from Cal State East Bay, she is the daughter of immigrants from Mexico and Guatemala, who have called Hayward home for 26 years. Professionally, Lupe has dedicated many years to serving Alameda County as a community outreach worker under the Health Care Services Agency within the Healthy Schools and Communities department. She is currently a Victim Offender Dialogue facilitator and trainer for Mend Collaborative. Lupe's dedication to public service extends beyond her professional life. She serves on the Commission on the Status of Women in Alameda County and the Ruby's Place Youth Advisory Board. Outside of her professional commitments, Lupe enjoys spending quality time with her husband and two beautiful children. In her free time, she enjoys live music, catching a Broadway show, and learning new languages.
2	Hoang Dao	Hoang Dao was born and raised for the vast majority of his life in the city of Hayward, California. He is an advocate for students, community, protecting the planet and justice for all. His passion for advocacy stemmed early on in grade school where he first-hand saw the inequity in students to gain fair access to education and the need to stand up to fight for change. This sparked his interest to have ran for office in student government where he was elected and served as a student body class representative in junior high to college senator in higher education. Through Hoang's youth leadership, it became the beacon of his hope for those who cannot speak for themselves. My commitment to the community extends beyond the classroom, as I actively engage in labor organizing, serving as the treasurer for the Hayward Education Association and their delegate to the Alameda Labor Council. I've dedicated my efforts to critical causes, organizing against school closures, for tenant protections, safer streets, sidewalks and bike lanes, and generally strive to uplift marginalized voices in our community. Additionally, I was the co-lead for the Climate Empowerment Learning Initiative, co-founded the Tennyson Green Team, created the Hayward United Facebook group and co-founded the Hayward Community Coalition with other amazing Hayward organizers. I'm an author, a father, a renter, a listener and a problem solver. In my leisure moments (which do exist on occasion!) you'll find me fishing, writing, exploring the city on my bike or the bus, or playing dungeons and dragons with friends. My life's mission is to empower our community to make Hayward better for everyone. This is my 3rd year on the commission, and I'm honored to be working with you all to ensure that Hayward's vital social safety nets receive the funding necessary for the work they do.

6	Daisy Maxion	Daisy Maxion (she/her/hers) is Filipino Advocates for Justice's Organizing Director. Daisy is a daughter of Filipino immigrants and is a native to the Bay Area in California. She has lived in Hayward for 20 years. She started her student advocacy in her early years as a student leader in her previous college experience. She served as the only Filipinx student body President across all 23 California State Universities at CSU East Bay in 2019-2020. She advocated on behalf of approximately 15,000 predominantly working class BIPOC and POC students. Daisy has led Census 2020 collaborative efforts with Alameda County Complete Count Committee and AAPI organizations and communities. She had also worked as the Community Organizer for various civic engagement campaigns in which she participated in leading efforts for GOTV digital organizing, making it accessible for the Filipinx community. Maxion continues to lead outreach, legislative, and organizing efforts that advocate for housing justice, voting, and domestic worker rights within the Filipinx/AAPI community.

8	Jayendra Singh	Jayendra (Jay) Singh is a dedicated community volunteer who supports the arts, education and community nonprofit organizations that serve the Hayward community. After working for 38 years in biotechnology, he retired in 2018 and has since dedicated himself to serving the community. Jay supports the arts community by volunteering with the A.R.T., Inc. Jay also is energetic member of charitable group "HELP FOR THE HELPLESS" a registered Charitable Trust, which assists the poorest of the poor, those whom society has neglected. All funds donated to Help for the Helpless reach the poor as its work is done on a volunteer basis. Trust members and supporters do this work without pay and most of the volunteers are college students and alumni. Help for the Helpless engages in humanitarian work and reaches out to the destitute, the deserted and the dispossessed. Help the Helpless find Institutions for mentally disturbed people living on the streets, build simple dwellings for those without shelter, provide medical treatment for the poor and the physically handicapped and support the educational needs of orphans and children from poor families. Jay supports his temple, regularly donating groceries to the temple so they can feed the poor on a regular basis. Jay proudly stands by his commitment to help the disadvantaged, deprived and poor, especially in hometown the city of Hayward. In April 2025 Jay received two Hearts of Hayward Award which honors volunteers who give their time and energy to benefit individuals, local social service organizations and programs in Hayward. Jay is being
