BACKGROUND (UPDATES)

July 24, 2017

 Staff presented a report on the Old Highlands Homeowners Association (OHHA) to the Council Infrastructure Committee

January 18, 2018 – Staff attended an OHHA neighborhood meeting where the OHHA Board of Directors presented tentative terms of an agreement for financing pavement rehabilitation to 58 residents/property owners





50/50

Cost Allocation

The work is to be funded equally by City and OHHA property owners.

- 5-6 year project
- \$1 mil/year



20 Years

Reimbursement Period

The City will provide the initial funding with property owner reimbursement over a twenty-year period.



FY 2020

Tentative Start Date

Pending a vote to approve the finance mechanism, the estimated start date will be scheduled mid-2020.



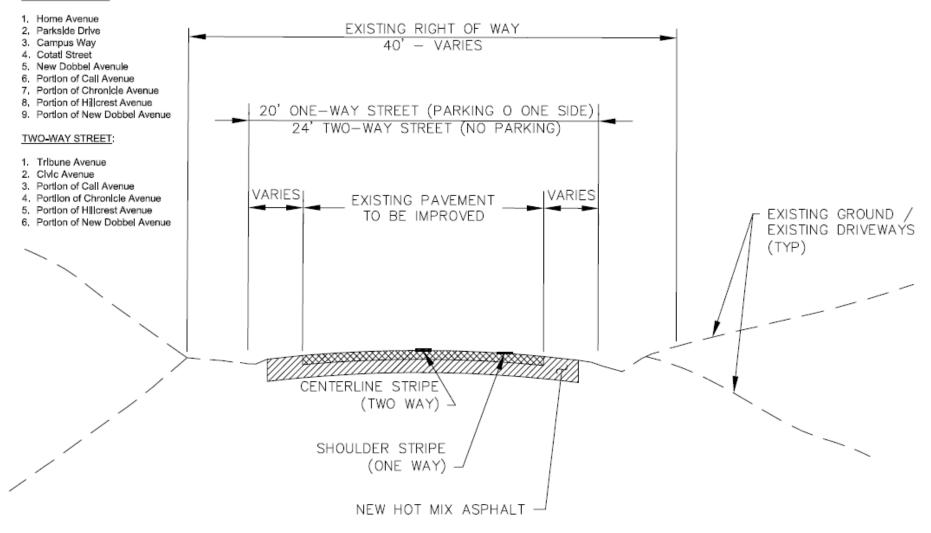

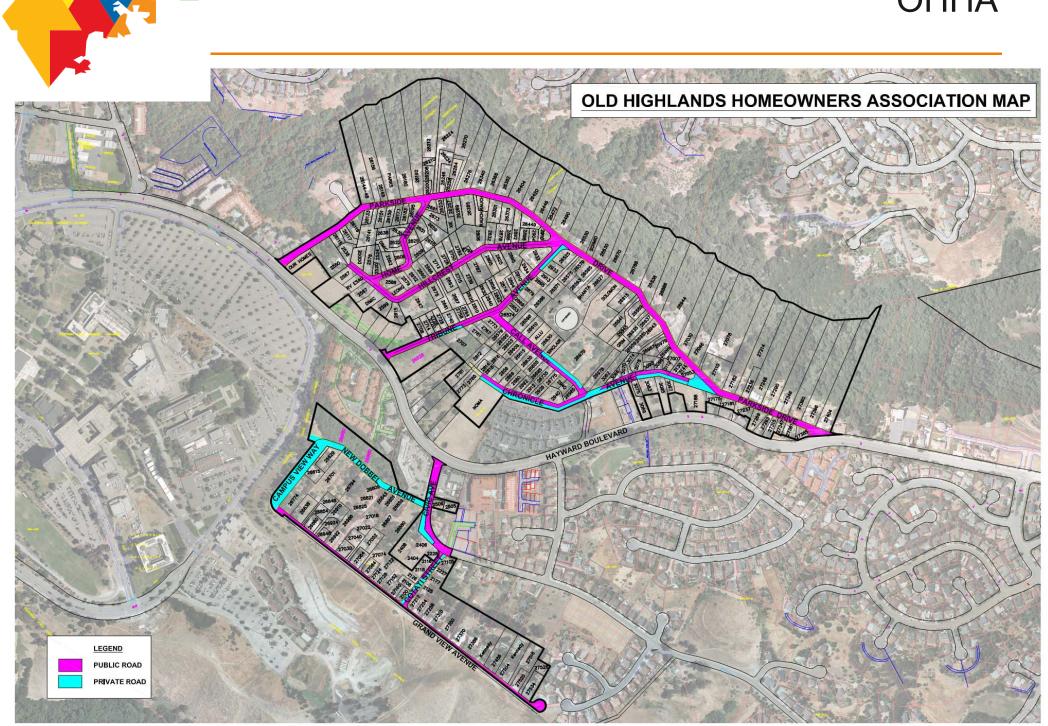

OHHA residents informally voted in favor of implementing a funding mechanism.

Professional Services Agreement to prepare an Engineer's Report, including, scope of work, estimated costs, benefit area and benefit formula.

Potential Community Facilities District or other means for assessing costs to property owners will require a majority vote of registered voters.

Grant deed documents for roadway dedication will be prepared by City surveyor and signed by property owners.

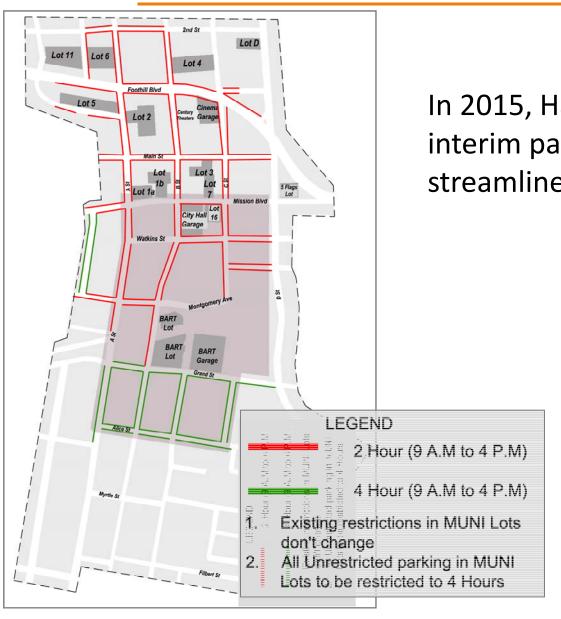

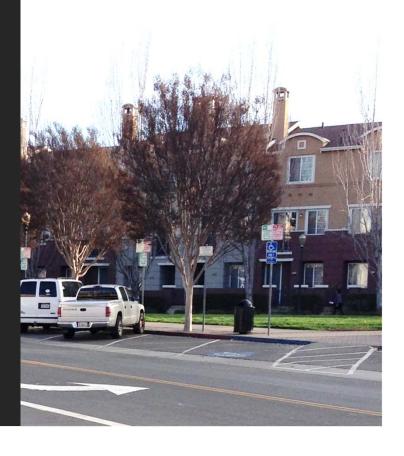
Residential Parking Permit (RPP)

Recommendations

- A. 1st permit free, 2nd permit \$150/year
- B. Limit of 2 permits/household
- C. Guest permits: 5-day limit \$5/permit

Rationale

- First permit free Hayward Initiative
- 2nd permit is high to discourage multiple vehicle ownership in Transit Oriented Development
