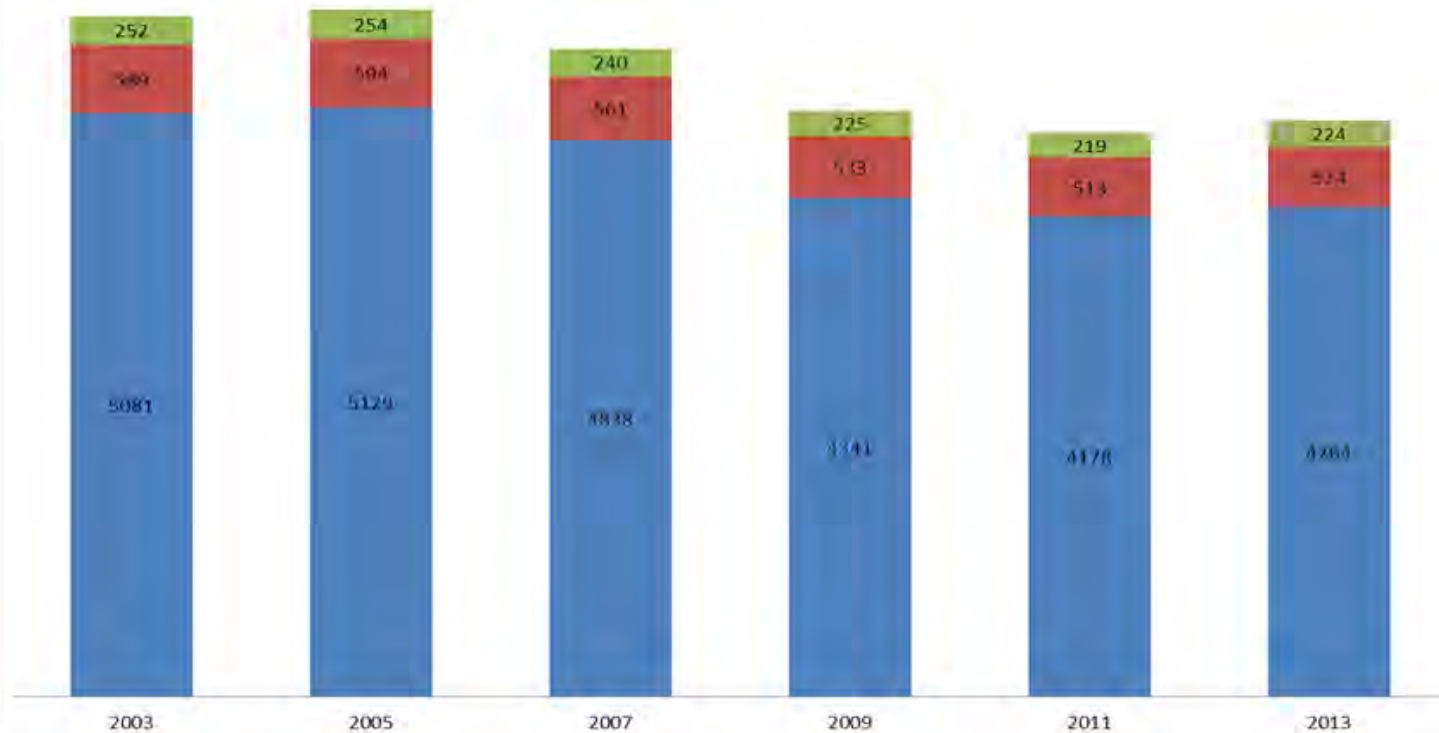

Estimated homeless population in Hayward, Mid-County and Alameda County



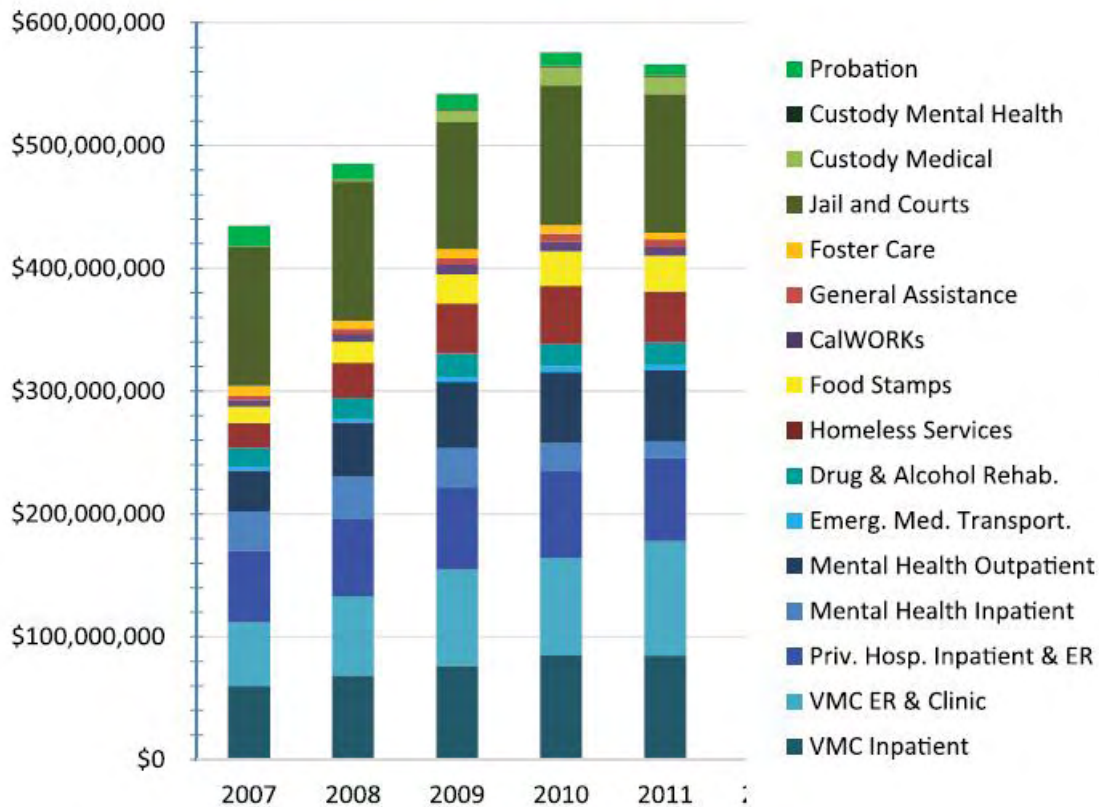

The Cost of Homelessness in Hayward



The City of Hayward currently provides approximately \$250,000 per year in direct funding support to local agencies and programs that work to address homelessness, hunger, and related issues in the Hayward community.

This long standing investment of resources comes primarily from the CDBG and Social Services grant programs.

In addition to this annual cash investment toward helping homeless residents in need, the City of Hayward invests significant in-kind costs to provide emergency and public safety response to homeless individuals—up to \$76,000 per individual per year in some cases.

Regardless of any plan or specific strategy that may be implemented locally, federal funding is critically important to making a significant impact on the homelessness issue locally.

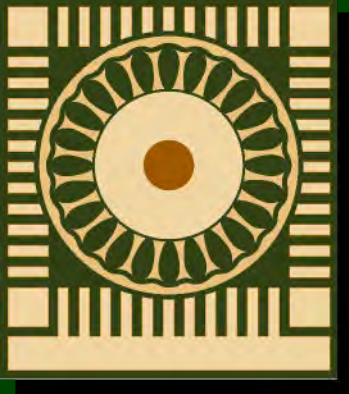

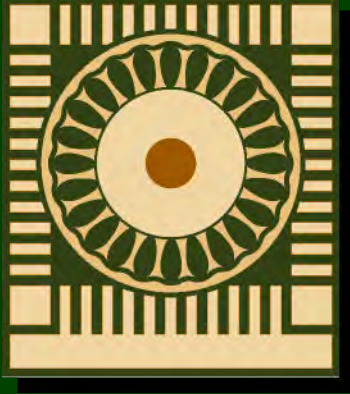

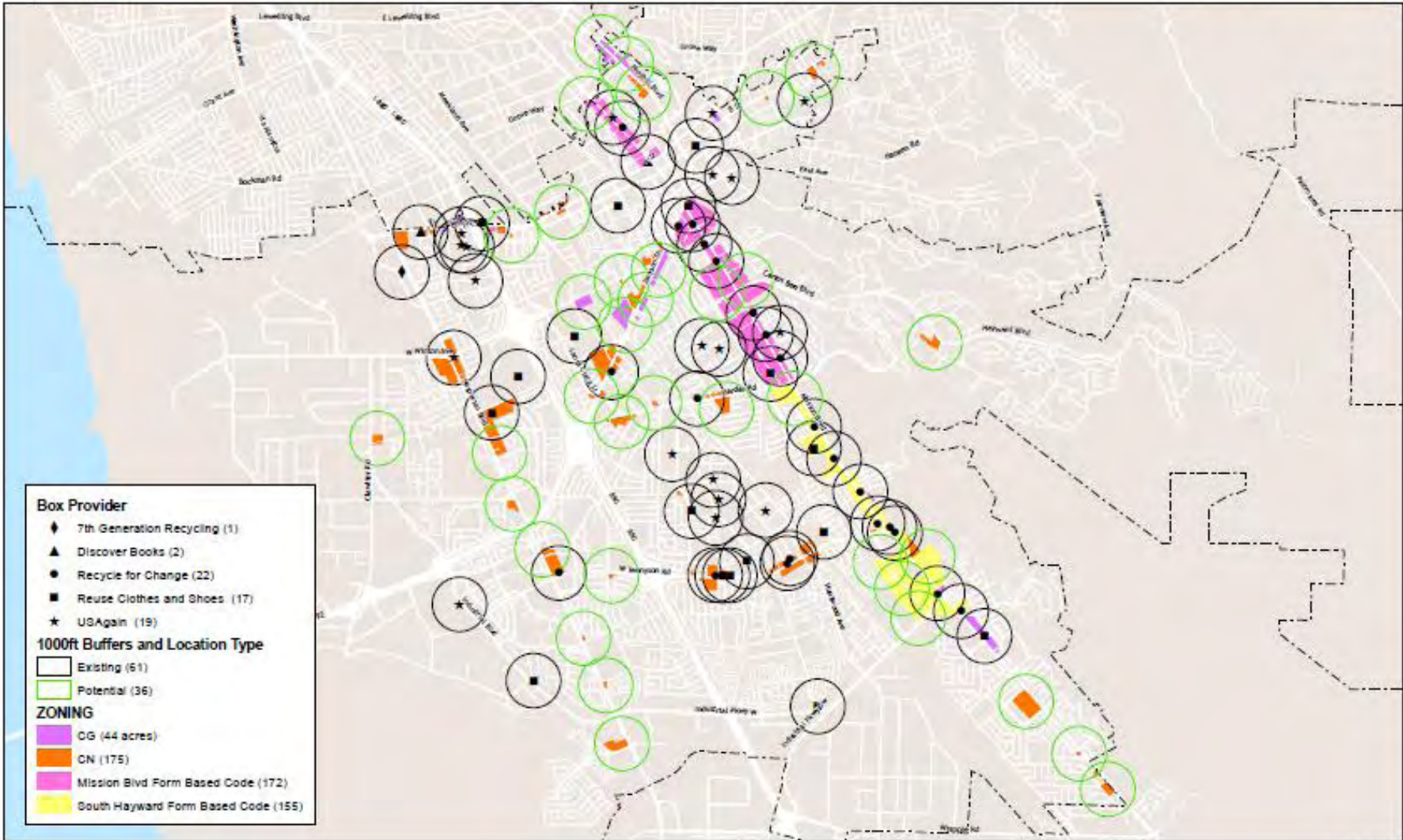
