COUNCIL REPORTS, REFERRALS, AND FUTURE AGENDA ITEMS

Council Member Zermeño announced there will be a meeting of the Association of Bay Area Governments on April 21, 2016.

Mayor Halliday noted the Hayward Youth Commission was conducting interviews on May 18, 2016, and asked Council Members to let her know if they are interested in serving on the interview panel.

PRESENTATION

The following groups were recognized: Community Services Commission, Keep Hayward Clean and Green Task Force, Library Commission, Personnel Commission, Planning Commission, Council Economic Development Committee, Downtown Business Improvement Area Advisory Board and Hayward Youth Commission; Hayward City Hall Volunteers and Interns; Hayward Fire Department (R.A.C.E.S.); Hayward Library (Homework Center, Literacy Plus, Friends of the Library, Seed Lending, Music & Memory, Spanish Reading Club); Hayward Police Department (Hayward Animal Shelter, Explorers, Reserve Officers, Neighborhood

Watch, HPD Volunteers); and Utilities and Environmental Services Department (Unite2 Green Leaders).

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Ms. Wynn Grcich, Hayward resident, spoke about an incident when she was hit by a drunk driver in 2011 and also spoke about the City's budget.

Mr. Edward Bogue, Hayward resident, invited everyone to a "Candidates Night" event for Hayward City Council candidates on April 6, 2016, at the Alameda County Flood Control Building.

Mr. Charlie Peters, Clean Air Performance Professionals representative, referred to a document, "The Most Despised Man in America."

Mr. Frank Burton, Hayward resident who also served on the Alameda County Community Choice Aggregation Steering Committee, spoke about the Community Choice Aggregation Program and its benefits.

Ms. Elva Duvac, Hayward resident, spoke about issues that the Hookah Lounge located at 25180 Mission Boulevard is causing her neighborhood.

Ms. Barbara Bernstein, Executive Director of Eden I&R, requested that the Council consider increasing the recommended grant amount from \$40,000 to \$50,000.

Ms. Marissa Seko, Family Violence Intervention Unit Coordinator for the Family Violence Law Center, thanked the City for the funding support recommendation for her agency and explained the services provided through her agency.

Ms. Gay McDaniel, Executive Director of the Family Emergency Shelter Coalition (FESCO), urged the Council to accept the staff and Commission's recommendations.

Mr. Chad Bojorquez, Hayward Project Director of Downtown Streets Team, thanked the Commission and staff's funding recommendation.

Utilities and Environmental Services Director Ameri provided a synopsis of the report and introduced Mr. Bruce Jensen, Senior Planner with the Alameda County Planning Department and Mr. Seth Baruch, Carbonomics' Consultant. Mr. Baruch delivered a presentation about the Community Choice Aggregation (CCA) program.

Discussion ensued among Council Members, City staff and Carbonomics Consultant Baruch regarding the possibility of establishing a CCA program also known as the Community Choice Energy (CCE) program; PG&E's role in the program; renewable energy resources;



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potential job prospects; community outreach programs to educate the public; rate structure; and the benefits of the program for the community.

Council Member Jones disclosed he is leasing a space for his business from the Hayward Area Historical Society, which is applying for funding. Therefore, he recused himself from participation on Item #8 and left the Council Chambers at 9:15 p.m.

8. FY 2017 Community Agency Funding Recommendations including Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Social Services, and Arts/Music; and Discussion of the CDBG Annual Action Plan and the CDBG Citizen Participation Plan **WS 16-025**

Staff report submitted by Community Services Manager Jaeger and Administrative Analyst McNamara, dated April 5, 2016, was filed.

Library and Community Services Director Reinhart acknowledged the members of the Community Services Commission in attendance, and provided a synopsis of the report.

Discussion ensued among Council Members and City staff regarding the proposed funding recommendations. Council Members offered the following suggestions for City staff: review the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding process; identify monies to fund agencies that need additional funding; provide performance metrics for larger grantees; provide summary of agencies' performance metrics to Community Services Commission members; reduce funding for past grantees so that new programs can be funded; include grantees' performance at a higher level in the review process; and evaluate how Eden I&R's funding can be increased from \$40,000 to \$50,000.

SUBJECT

Runway 10R-28L Rehabilitation Project at Hayward Executive Airport: Approval of Plans and Specifications and Call for Bids

RECOMMENDATION

That Council adopts the attached resolution (Attachment I) approving the plans and specifications for the Runway 10R-28L Rehabilitation Project at Hayward Executive Airport project, calling for bids to be received on May 17, 2016.

BACKGROUND

As previously presented at the Council Airport Committee meeting on January 22, 2015, rust resulting from the oxidation of iron minerals in the pavement aggregate is penetrating through the existing runway markings on Runway 10R-28L at the Hayward Executive Airport. This has reduced the contrast between the dark pavement and white paint markings and could create potential unsafe conditions for aircraft using the runway. This project calls for the rehabilitation of the main runway. The proposed improvements will remove the top two inches of oxidized pavement that will be replaced with new asphalt pavement. By carefully testing the new asphalt to confirm that it meets standards, we do not expect a reoccurrence of this problem.

DISCUSSION

Runway 10R-28L is primarily used by jet and turboprop aircraft and is the most critical runway for aircraft approaching the Airport. If oxidation of aggregate in the pavement is allowed to progress, particles could begin to flake and loosen from the pavement surface potentially causing damage to aircraft. A specialist from the Airport's consultant, AECOM, evaluated the runway and recommended that milling the existing pavement and applying a two-inch asphalt lift with proper mix should alleviate the rust issue. It was determined there are no sealants or other chemical products on the market that can successfully address the rust issue as an alternative to removing the oxidized pavement layer and repaying the runway.

A key staff objective is to reduce the overall cost of capital projects through the use of grants from local, state or federal government. On September 28, 2015, staff was informed that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) had tentatively approved funding in the amount of \$1,935,000 to resurface Runway 10R-28L. This was in addition to a grant recently approved by Caltrans in the amount of \$499,000 for the same project. To move forward with the FAA grant process, a resolution from Council approving the plans and specification and call for bids must be approved.

This project is categorically exempt under Section 15301(c) of the California Environmental Quality Act Guidelines for the operation, repair, maintenance, or minor alteration of existing facilities.

FISCAL IMPACT

The estimated project costs are as follows:

PUBLIC CONTACT

The public was initially informed of the project and the potential FAA and Caltrans grants in the staff report dated January 22, 2015 to the Council Airport Committee (CAC). Based on input from the Council members of CAC and the public, the Airport Manager subsequently formed an advisory group of airport tenants to provide feedback during the initial planning phase of the project. Two informational meetings with the advisory group were held on May 7, 2015 and March 1, 2016. Pavement experts participated in those meetings and presented options to address the concerns expressed by airport tenants.

The project was also the subject of additional staff reports and public presentations to the CAC on April 23, 2015 and October 22, 2015. The project was highlighted in airport newsletters dated August 2015 and April 2016. The newsletter is distributed to all airport tenants and posted online. Staff will work closely with paving experts and based tenants to minimize runway downtime.

NEXT STEPS

The final schedule will be determined based upon FAA grant approval. Once the bids are received, and a recommendation of award of the lowest responsible bidder is provided to the FAA, the FAA will provide

notification of the available funding for this project.

Construction work will include a required sixty-calendar day mobilization and Airport safety training period with the closure of the main Runway 10R-28L for only seven consecutive calendar days as noted below. The completion of the remaining project work will not require runway closures.

The estimated schedule is as follows:

SUBJECT

Approval of Budget Appropriation for Hazardous Materials Program Settlement Funds **RECOMMENDATION**

That the City Council approves a budget appropriation in the amount of \$225,350.50 for received Hazardous Materials Program settlement funds.

BACKGROUND

The Hazardous Materials Program of the Hayward Fire Department's Fire Prevention Office has been designated by the State of California to be the Certified Unified Program Agency (CUPA) in the City of Hayward. As a CUPA, the Hazardous Materials Program has been a party to numerous lawsuits and administrative enforcements involving companies and regulated entities within the City who violate hazardous materials/waste-related rules and regulations established by State, County, or City statutes. Examples of violations include the improper handling/disposal/reporting of hazardous materials/waste, inappropriate monitoring/safeguards associated with underground fuel tanks, and the failure to adhere to conditions outlined in City-issued permits. Many of the cases are resolved via monetary awards, otherwise known as settlements, with the City CUPA receiving a share of such funds.

DISCUSSION

As the settlement amounts are received by the City CUPA, they are deposited, as required by law, into a special fund in order to avoid comingling the funds with general purpose sources, such as the General Fund. While each settlement has certain stipulations attached to how funds can be utilized by the City, the overwhelming majority of the settlements have similar conditions and can be used towards the purchase of any equipment or services that promote the goals of hazardous materials/waste compliance.

For example, the Hazardous Materials Program/CUPA utilizes software that is expressly for the purpose of monitoring compliance with state hazardous materials/waste programs. The software is connected to a State database called the California Environmental Reporting System (CERS). If there are issues with the software (i.e. upgrades or new features), a consultant can be retained and funded from settlement money to assist Hazardous Materials staff with understanding the new functions of the software. Other items, such as computers, are also allowed under the settlement terms as they are utilized to primarily support hazardous materials/waste-related programs. Hazardous Materials Program staff is currently in the process of developing and establishing a list of needs in order to ensure that the program keeps current and viable with the ever-changing landscape of new codes and laws surrounding hazardous materials/waste inspections and enforcement. A portion of the funds will be utilized to address any immediate concerns, and any remaining amounts will be carried forward into FY 2017 to address other issues that may arise.

FISCAL IMPACT

The total amount of \$225,350.50 will have a positive impact on the General Fund as many of these costs would have been borne from the Fire Department's operating fund, but instead will be paid for out of this special fund.

PUBLIC CONTACT

No public hearings or meetings were required for this item.

NEXT STEPS

If approved, the Department's administrative staff will work with Hazardous Materials staff to evaluate and monitor the requests for needed supplies and services, ensuring that the requests are appropriate per the terms and conditions of each settlement and that future purchases adhere to all existing City purchasing and approval polices and procedures.

Adoption of a Resolution of Intention to Introduce an Ordinance Approving an Amendment to the Contract between the City of Hayward and the California Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) for Miscellaneous Members in HAME, Local 21, and the Unpresented Employee Group

RECOMMENDATION

That the City Council adopts the attached Resolution of Intention to approve and introduce an Ordinance executing the amendment of the City of Hayward's contract with PERS to add a provision for cost sharing for the Miscellaneous Members in HAME, Local 21 and the Unrepresented Employee Group.

BACKGROUND

Employee salaries and benefits comprise approximately eighty percent of the City's expenses. Over the last five years, the City of Hayward has worked hard to close a growing structural General Fund gap each fiscal year. Significant changes to employee salary and benefit packages are a key element in closing this gap.

When City Council adopted the FY 2016 Budget in June 2015, the General Fund projected a balanced budget with no use of General Fund Reserves. This was accomplished through difficult decisions made by the City Council and increased sharing of compensation costs by most of the City's bargaining units.

The City has worked hard to keep the budget balanced; however, the unbudgeted increases in expenditures due to changes to the agreements between the City and many of the employee bargaining units, the settlement of claims levied against the City, as well as increases to other operating costs, have made the task increasingly difficult. While revenue projections have increased, they have not kept pace with expenses. Revised projections now forecast a \$5.7 million gap in FY 2016. Furthermore, the General Fund structural gap is projected to return in FY 2017, and absent additional cost-cutting efforts (or significant new revenues), it will grow in future years.

Despite the financial challenges, the City remains committed to providing fair and competitive benefits

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packages in a fiscally responsible manner that also addresses the structural gap. This task is extremely challenging because given available alternatives, any reasonable solution to achieve long-term financial stability at this time must include increased employee contributions toward the growing cost of benefits.

Since FY 2010, the City's employee groups have assisted the City with reducing the projected budget gap through wage concessions and benefit cost-sharing. The Police and Fire groups restructured their contracts and agreed to increased contributions to the employer share of PERS, and currently pay a total of fifteen percent toward retirement costs. The City concluded labor negotiations in 2015 with Service Employees International, Local 1021 ("SEIU"), the Hayward Association of Management Employees, ("HAME"), and International Federation of Professional Engineers, Local 21 ("Local 21"), revised the Salary and Benefits Resolution for Unrepresented employees (; and extended employment agreements with the Council appointed employees. All of these agreements, which cover all Miscellaneous Employee groups from a CalPERS perspective, include cost sharing that allows for the employee to pay a portion of the employer's retirement contribution as described below.

To implement any changes to the retirement program, it is necessary to amend the City's existing contracts with CalPERS each fiscal year. The Resolution authorizes staff to work with CalPERS to amend the miscellaneous contract to incorporate the cost sharing provision. The proposed Ordinance approves the amendment and authorizes staff to execute the contract effective June 27, 2016.

DISCUSSION

The City contracts with CalPERS for retirement benefits. The existing CalPERS contract for Miscellaneous members (non-safety) requires Classic members (hired prior to January 1, 2013) to pay eight percent of their salaries for the employees' share of retirement costs. Public Employees' Pension Reform Act ("PEPRA") members (hired on or after January 1, 2013 and receiving overall lower retirement benefits than Classic members) are required to contribute fifty percent of the normal cost of PERS benefits, which is currently 12.50%. Therefore, PEPRA employees are required to contribute 6.25% of their salaries for the employees' share of retirement costs. The City currently contributes 24.467% for FY 2016, which increases in FY 2017 to 26.388% for the employer share.

Under the terms of the current MOU's and the Unrepresented Salary and Benefits Resolution, HAME, Local 21, and Unrepresented, all members will continue to pay the current employee contribution of eight percent for classic members and 6.25% for PEPRA members in addition to a total of three percent of the employer's share phased in one percent per year beginning in FY 2016, for a total of eleven percent contribution by FY 2018 for classic members and a total of 9.25% for PEPRA members. This employee contribution toward the employer rate shall be credited to each member's account as a normal contribution effective the first pay period following thirty days of the adoption of the final Ordinance. This action by the Council to amend the CalPERS agreement will allow the FY 2017 deductions to commence.

Under the terms of their negotiated agreement, SEIU elected to not contribute to medical insurance and make a contribution of 4.5% (in addition to the full 8% employee's share except for PEPRA members as identified above) toward the employer share of PERS, phased in over the contract period, for a total PERS contribution of 12.5% (8 % employee share plus the additional 4.5% employer share. SEIU further

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agreed that the additional contributions toward the employer share would be made pursuant to Government Code Section 20516 (f), which allows the contributions to be effective without a contract amendment.

Under 201516(f), the amount of the City's employer contribution paid by bargaining unit members would not be credited to the members' individual CalPERS accounts. Choosing to not have the additional contribution toward the employers share credited to the members' individual account only impacts employees who leave PERS service and withdraw their funds or beneficiaries of employees who did not retire prior to death. If an employee or beneficiary withdraws their contributions, they receive what has been credited to their account, which in this case would not include the additional contribution to the employer share. It is estimated that more than 95% of employees retire from PERS service and do not prematurely withdraw their contributions. Under 20516(f), the additional contributions are in the employer's fund and offset unfunded liabilities.

Table 1 summarizes the additional share of the employer's contribution the Miscellaneous Employee groups have agreed to contribute beyond their current eight percent employee contribution.

*All Miscellaneous Employees currently pay their full eight percent Employee Contribution amount. The above table reflects the additional amount employee's will contribute toward the Employer Contribution in each fiscal year.

FISCAL IMPACT

The approximate total cost of the negotiated salary and benefit packages for the Miscellaneous Groups is \$5 million dollars. The additional contributions toward the employer share of PERS costs offset the cost of the salary and benefit packages by approximately \$2.7 million during the contract terms, while keeping the current benefit options intact.

The cost sharing contributions with the Miscellaneous Groups are consistent with the City's philosophical structure of protecting the robust benefits we receive and asking for greater employee contributions toward the cost of their health and retirement benefits.

These contributions are structural in nature and represent significant ongoing and permanent savings. Table 2 summarizes the approximate value of the cost sharing contributions for each employee group.

NEXT STEPS

Human Resources staff will work with the bargaining units and Finance Department staff to complete the contract amendment process. The final reading of the Ordinance will be presented during a Public Hearing on May 24, 2016. If approved, the Ordinance will take effect on June 23, 2016. The contract amendment will be effective June 27, 2016.

The three percent employee cost-share is phased in at one percent each fiscal year. In accordance with Government Code Section 20516, CalPERS requires a new contract amendment each fiscal year to phase in the additional one percent contribution. Currently, employees are contributing one percent. The proposed contract amendment will increase that amount an additional one percent, for a total of two percent in FY 2017. Staff will return to Council to amend the PERS contract for another one percent, for a total of three percent for FY 2018 for HAME, Local 21 and the Unrepresented groups; and another 1.5% for a total of 4.5% for SEIU.. Table 3 is the tentative schedule for the FY 2017 and FY 2018 CalPERS contract amendments.

California Public Employees' Retirement System

AMENDMENT TO CONTRACT

Between the Board of Administration California Public Employees' Retirement System and the City Council City of Hayward

The Board of Administration, California Public Employees' Retirement System, hereinafter referred to as Board, and the governing body of the above public agency, hereinafter referred to as Public Agency, having entered into a contract effective October 1, 1950, and witnessed August 7, 1950, and as amended effective January 16, 1952, January 1, 1956, April 1, 1959, January 1, 1960, November 1, 1962, April 1, 1965, December 1, 1969, July 1, 1973, July 16, 1973, June 1, 1978, April 23, 1979, January 12, 1981, March 9, 1981, July 11, 1986, October 10, 1988, June 21, 1991, June 19, 1992, March 8, 1996, January 1, 2001, April 1, 2001, July 1, 2001, August 26, 2002, May 23, 2008, July 4, 2011, February 24, 2014 and July 27, 2015 which provides for participation of Public Agency in said System, Board and Public Agency hereby agree as follows:

- A. Paragraphs 1 through 14 are hereby stricken from said contract as executed effective July 27, 2015, and hereby replaced by the following paragraphs numbered 1 through 16 inclusive:
 - 1. All words and terms used herein which are defined in the Public Employees' Retirement Law shall have the meaning as defined therein unless otherwise specifically provided. "Normal retirement age" shall mean age 55 for classic local miscellaneous members, age 62 for new local miscellaneous members, age 50 for classic local safety members and age 57 for new local safety members.
 - 2. Public Agency shall participate in the Public Employees' Retirement System from and after October 1, 1950 making its employees as hereinafter provided, members of said System subject to all provisions of the Public Employees' Retirement Law except such as apply only on election of a contracting agency and are not provided for herein and to all amendments to said Law hereafter enacted except those, which by express provisions thereof, apply only on the election of a contracting agency.

- 3. Public Agency agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) and its trustees, agents and employees, the CalPERS Board of Administration, and the California Public Employees' Retirement Fund from any claims, demands, actions, losses, liabilities, damages, judgments, expenses and costs, including but not limited to interest, penalties and attorney fees that may arise as a result of any of the following:
 - (a) Public Agency's election to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas under this Contract that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under the Public Agency's prior non-CalPERS retirement program.
 - (b) Any dispute, disagreement, claim, or proceeding (including without limitation arbitration, administrative hearing, or litigation) between Public Agency and its employees (or their representatives) which relates to Public Agency's election to amend this Contract to provide retirement benefits, provisions or formulas that are different than such employees' existing retirement benefits, provisions or formulas.
 - (c) Public Agency's agreement with a third party other than CalPERS to provide retirement benefits, provisions, or formulas that are different than the retirement benefits, provisions or formulas provided under this Contract and provided for under the California Public Employees' Retirement Law.
- 4. Employees of Public Agency in the following classes shall become members of said Retirement System except such in each such class as are excluded by law or this agreement:
 - a. Local Fire Fighters (herein referred to as local safety members);
 - b. Local Police Officers (herein referred to as local safety members);
 - c. Employees other than local safety members (herein referred to as local miscellaneous members).
- 5. In addition to the classes of employees excluded from membership by said Retirement Law, the following classes of employees shall not become members of said Retirement System:
 - a. PERSONS EMPLOYED AFTER JANUARY 16, 1952 AS CROSSING GUARDS; AND
 - b. PERSONS EMPLOYED AFTER JANUARY 30, 1959 AS PART-TIME LIFEGUARDS AND PART-TIME LIBRARY AIDES.

- 6. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service for classic local miscellaneous members in employment before and not on or after August 26, 2002 shall be determined in accordance with Section 21354 of said Retirement Law, subject to the reduction provided therein for service on and after January 1, 1956, the effective date of Social Security coverage, and prior to December 30, 1980, termination of Social Security, for members whose service has been included in Federal Social Security (2% at age 55 Full and Modified).
- 7. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service for classic local miscellaneous members in employment on or after August 26, 2002 shall be determined in accordance with Section 21354.4 of said Retirement Law, subject to the reduction provided therein for service on and after January 1, 1956, the effective date of Social Security coverage, and prior to December 30, 1980, termination of Social Security, for members whose service has been included in Federal Social Security (2.5% at age 55 Full and Modified).
- 8. The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a new local miscellaneous member shall be determined in accordance with Section 7522.20 of said Retirement Law (2% at age 62 Full).
- The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a classic local safety member shall be determined in accordance with Section 21362.2 of said Retirement Law (3% at age 50 Full).
- The percentage of final compensation to be provided for each year of credited prior and current service as a new local safety member shall be determined in accordance with Section 7522.25(d) of said Retirement Law (2.7% at age 57 Full).
- 11. Public Agency elected and elects to be subject to the following optional provisions:
 - a. Section 21573 (Third Level of 1959 Survivor Benefits) for local safety members only.
 - b. Sections 21624 and 21626 (Post-Retirement Survivor Allowance) for local safety members only.
 - c. Section 20042 (One-Year Final Compensation) for classic members only.
 - d. Section 21635 (Post-Retirement Survivor Allowance to Continue After Remarriage) for local safety members only.

- e. Section 21024 (Military Service Credit as Public Service).
- f. Section 21027 (Military Service Credit for Retired Persons).
- g. Section 21551 (Continuation of Pre-Retirement Death Benefits After Remarriage of Survivor).
- h. Section 21022 (Public Service Credit for Periods of Lay-Off) for local miscellaneous members only.
- i. Section 21574 (Fourth Level of 1959 Survivor Benefits) for local miscellaneous members only.
- j. Section 20903 (Two Years Additional Service Credit).
- k. Section 20965 (Credit for Unused Sick Leave) for local fire members only.
- I. Section 21547.7 (Alternate Death Benefit for Local Fire Members Credited with 20 or More Years of Service).
- m. Section 20516 (Employees Sharing Cost of Additional Benefits):

Section 21362.2 (3% @ 50) effective January 1, 2001 and Section 20042 (One-Year Final Compensation) effective January 12, 1981 for classic local fire members. The employee cost sharing contribution is not to exceed 15.607%. The maximum employee cost sharing contribution is the normal cost plus the increase in the accrued liability due to the benefit improvement amortized over 20 years. In no event shall the employee cost sharing contribution attributable to the unfunded liability remain in effect beyond June 30 preceding the 20th anniversary of the effective date of the additional benefits. Therefore, after June 30, 2020, in any given contribution year, the maximum employee cost sharing contribution cannot exceed 5.986%.

Section 21362.2 (3% @ 50) effective July 1, 2001 and Section 20042 (One-Year Final Compensation) effective April 23, 1979 for classic local police members. The employee cost sharing contribution is not to exceed 13.882%. The maximum employee cost sharing contribution is the normal cost plus the increase in the accrued liability due to the benefit improvement amortized over 20 years. In no event shall the employee cost sharing contribution attributable to the unfunded liability remain in effect beyond June 30 preceding the 20th anniversary of the effective date of the additional benefits. Therefore, after June 30, 2021, in any given contribution year, the maximum employee cost sharing contribution cannot exceed 5.505%.

n. Section 20516 (Employees Sharing Additional Cost):

From and after February 24, 2014, 3.75% for new local fire members.

From and after July 27, 2015, 2.25% for new local police members.

From and after the effective date of this amendment to contract, 2% for local miscellaneous members in the Hayward Association of Management Employees Group, International Federation of Professional and Technical Engineers Local 21, Unrepresented Group, and Council Appointed Employee Group.

The portion of the employer's contribution that the member agrees to contribute from his or her compensation, over and above the member's normal contribution ("Cost Sharing Percentage"), shall not exceed the Employer Normal Cost Rate, as that rate is defined in the CalPERS Actuarial Valuation for the relevant fiscal year. If the Cost Sharing Percentage will exceed the relevant Employer Normal Cost Rate, the Cost Sharing Percentage shall automatically be reduced to an amount equal to, and not to exceed, the Employer Normal Cost Rate for the relevant fiscal year.

- 12. Public Agency, in accordance with Government Code Section 20790, ceased to be an "employer" for purposes of Section 20834 effective on June 1, 1978. Accumulated contributions of Public Agency shall be fixed and determined as provided in Government Code Section 20834, and accumulated contributions thereafter shall be held by the Board as provided in Government Code Section 20834.
- 13. Public Agency shall contribute to said Retirement System the contributions determined by actuarial valuations of prior and future service liability with respect to local miscellaneous members and local safety members of said Retirement System.
- 14. Public Agency shall also contribute to said Retirement System as follows:
 - a. Contributions required per covered member on account of the 1959 Survivor Benefits provided under Section 21573 of said Retirement Law. (Subject to annual change.) In addition, all assets and liabilities of Public Agency and its employees shall be pooled in a single account, based on term insurance rates, for survivors of all local safety members.
 - b. Contributions required per covered member on account of the 1959 Survivor Benefits provided under Section 21574 of said Retirement Law. (Subject to annual change.) In addition, all assets and liabilities of Public Agency and its employees shall be pooled in a single account, based on term insurance rates, for survivors of all local miscellaneous members.

- c. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment within 60 days of date of contract to cover the costs of administering said System as it affects the employees of Public Agency, not including the costs of special valuations or of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.
- d. A reasonable amount, as fixed by the Board, payable in one installment as the occasions arise, to cover the costs of special valuations on account of employees of Public Agency, and costs of the periodic investigation and valuations required by law.
- 15. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be subject to adjustment by Board on account of amendments to the Public Employees' Retirement Law, and on account of the experience under the Retirement System as determined by the periodic investigation and valuation required by said Retirement Law.
- 16. Contributions required of Public Agency and its employees shall be paid by Public Agency to the Retirement System within fifteen days after the end of the period to which said contributions refer or as may be prescribed by Board regulation. If more or less than the correct amount of contributions is paid for any period, proper adjustment shall be made in connection with subsequent remittances. Adjustments on account of errors in contributions required of any employee may be made by direct payments between the employee and the Board.

SUBJECT

Police Administration Building Needs Assessment Progress and Amendment to Agreement with RossDrulisCusenberry for Additional Needs Assessment Work

RECOMMENDATION

That Council reviews and comments on this report and staff's presentation, and authorizes the City Manager to amend the agreement with RossDrulisCusenbery for an increase of \$75,000 to cover additional study costs.

BACKGROUND

The approximately 39,000 square foot Hayward Police Department administration facility on Winton Avenue was completed in 1975. In 2003, almost 2,000 square feet of additional office space was added to the administration building to accommodate the Youth and Family Services program, as well as the Communications Center. This forty-one year old building and the subsequent expansion no longer meets the space, operational, and security needs of the department. Policing operations are hampered by lack of space and outdated interior planning. Teams that should work closely together are separated with the use of modular buildings outside the main building. Further, there is insufficient parking to accommodate department and staff vehicles. Prudent investment in an adequately sized replacement building at this point in time will ensure that the department can efficiently and cost-effectively meet the needs of the community for many years into the future.

With that in mind, on December 17, 2013, City Council authorized the City Manager to negotiate and execute an agreement with RossDrulisCusenbery Architecture (RDC) for Professional Services for the facilities needs assessment study and master planning for the Police Administration Building, along with a similar study for six Fire Stations and the Fire Training Center.

DISCUSSION

This study was geared toward determining the needed building space and service needs to serve the Hayward community over the next twenty-five years or more. At that time, three possible locations for

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siting the new Police Administration building were considered. These were: (Site A) the current building site on West Winton Avenue, (Site B) a City-owned lot between City Hall and the Hayward BART Station, and (Site C) an existing structure that could be modified to satisfy police space and service needs. The former Mervyn's headquarters site on Foothill Boulevard was selected as the existing structure to be considered (see Attachment I).

While preparing this study, RDC worked closely with the Hayward Police Department (HPD) command staff to verify their department's requirements for workload, staffing, space, functionality and security. From this, RDC developed a unique understanding of the HPD's facility and operational needs. The 2014 study indicates that the current building is undersized by approximately 27,000 SF for its current program requirements and undersized by approximately 53,000 SF for the projected 2040 program requirements. The staff presentation at the meeting will review in more detail how the space requirements were determined.

Based on the projected 2040 building size, RDC developed a schematic design for a viable police administration building on each of the three possible building sites that were identified early in this process, then estimated the costs to construct each of these facilities. The rough order of magnitude (ROM) estimates of costs were as follows:

After evaluating the pros and cons of the schematic designs for each of these sites, the existing Police Administration Building site on West Winton Avenue was determined to be the most desirable location for a new facility <u>at this preliminary stage</u>. The existing site is an appropriate size, is near I-880, SR 92, and Alameda County's court facilities, has room for expansion, and has reasonable setback distances from West Winton Avenue and Santa Clara Street. While Site A appears to be the best alternative studied, the 2014 study focused on replacing, not renovating or expanding, the existing building at its current location. RDC and staff believe that there may be additional opportunities to utilize the existing building or adjacent park lands to reduce costs and mitigate the less efficient aspects of the proposed design.

Since this preliminary effort, some elements have changed affecting these choices: (1) Alameda Criminal Court functions may be moving from the area; and (2) Council and others have expressed a desire to seriously consider locating the Police facility in South Hayward; and (3) the Mervyn's site is no longer an option. Staff is recommending an amendment to the RDC professional services agreement for a supplemental study of Site A to evaluate the existing building's structural system, and four options for renovation and/or expansion (see Attachment II). These are:

1) On Site Renovation/Expansion with the Current Program: including a conceptual construction phasing plan and a temporary accommodation plan.

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- 2) On Site Renovation/Expansion with Consolidation of Other Remotely Located Facilities: renovating and expanding the existing building while studying the potential to relocate other remotely located functions in an expanded facility, including a conceptual construction phasing plan and temporary accommodation plan. These other remotely located functions include the Animal Shelter, Property and Evidence Warehouse, Fitness Room area, and Long-gun Range.
- 3) New Police Building on Park Property across Santa Clara Street: constructing a new Police Building on the adjacent HARD park property after a "land swap" with HARD. No phasing would be required for this option (i.e. build a new building, then move PD, then demolish old).
- 4) Demolish and Replace Existing Building On Site: updating the previously authorized study with any new info that emerges from the three options above.

During this additional phase of the study, there will be some preliminary investigation of the possibility of sites in South Hayward. Staff will also determine if and when the Alameda County Criminal Courts may be moving, and the impact this may have on location of the Police facility, as well as what economic development opportunities this may open up along Winton Avenue.

FISCAL IMPACT

Council approved a professional services agreement (PSA) with RDC for the Police & Fire Needs Assessment Study for a not-to-exceed amount of \$200,000 and another \$20,000 for City staff oversight. The estimated additional cost to complete the PSA for the Police Administration Building Study is as follows:

The overall cost of the Police/Fire study with this amendment is now \$305,000 (\$220,000 plus \$85,000).

PUBLIC CONTACT

Upon completion of the Needs Assessment Study and identification of feasible options, staff will return to Council for further direction. As the project moves forward from that point, staff will conduct appropriate community meetings for comments and input on next steps.

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NEXT STEPS

After completion of the draft study, staff will report findings to City Council during the fall of 2016.
