






Requests for funding far exceeded available funds in FY 2022



HAY WARD

The CSC recommended Council award \$1,902,954 to 39 community agencies for FY 2022



Methodology

- Funded agencies submit regular performance report updates to the Community Services Division
- Agencies report unduplicated totals for:
 - Residence
 - Ethnicity
 - Race
 - Gender
 - Ability
 - Age
 - Household income, size, and other characteristics


- Agencies specify quantitative outcomes for serving low-income Hayward residents, such as:
 - # individuals served
 - # trainings provided
 - # jobs created
 - # outreach events
- Staff calculated agencies' completion percentage for their quantitative outcomes



FY 21-22 Community Agency Performance



Over half (56%) of individuals served in 2022 were white



- Among Hayward residents served in FY 2022:
 - 49% (16,998) identified as Hispanic
 - 51% (16,804) identified as a race other than White.

Agencies reinstated and expanded programs for children



- Ages varied across program type
- In 2022, children and teens made up 69% of residents served, versus 14% in 2020.

Agencies served many of Hayward's most vulnerable residents

 Across all programs with data (excluding arts & music), 90% were lowincome individuals or households

- Across all programs with data, 6% reported having a disability
 - Among CDBG recipients, 24% had a disability



Most programs met or exceeded their targets

- 24 out of 38 (63%) agencies met their targets
 - COVID-19 capacity constraints were the primary reason for agencies not meeting their goals
 - In many cases, goals were set assuming a "return to normal" that didn't happen during the FY
- For comparison
 - 27 out of 39 (69%) agencies met their targets in FY 2020-2021
 - 21 out of 34 (62%) agencies met their targets in FY 2019-2020





- FY 2023-2024 Community Agency Funding Process
 - This process will implement changes affirmed in June 2022

Background



City of Hayward Three-Year Strategic Roadmap Timeline

July 2019: City kicked off Strategic Roadmap process to inform FY2021 – FY2023

January 28, 2020: Council adopted the Three-Year Strategic Roadmap for FY2021 – FY2023

Since adoption, there have been two annual updates

June 1, 2021: Council adopted updates to the Roadmap to reflect timelines that were extended and new projects that were added due to COVID-19

May 3, 2022: Council adopted the Revised FY2021-23 Strategic Roadmap



City of Hayward Strategic Priorities





Prior CSC Involvement in Strategic Roadmap Annual Review

November 2021: City Council adopts a resolution apologizing to Black, Indigenous, and People of Color (BICOP) and Latinx community members for its implicit and explicit role in perpetuating historical institutional racism in the City (Recommendation from CSC)

 As part of the resolution, the CSC recommended 11 tangible actions for the City to take to address the City's wrongdoings and complicity in historical institutional racism

December 2021: CSC prioritized their recommendations for Council consideration as part of Strategic Roadmap annual review

January 2022: CSC recommendations presented to Council

May 2022: Council adopted the Revised FY2021-23 Strategic Roadmap, including recommendations from CSC



CAF Overview

- The City receives applications from community agencies requesting funding through the competitive CAF process
- ► The CSC serves as an advisory body to the Council
- The CSC makes recommendations to Council regarding the distribution of Infrastructure and Economic Development (CDBG), Public/Social Services (CDBG/General Fund), and Arts, Music, and Special Events (General Fund) program funding through the annual CAF process
- The CSC reviews all eligible applications, and the CSC Chairperson appoints three ARCs by funding category (Infrastructure/Economic Development, Public/Social Services, and Arts, Music, & Special Events) to conduct applicant interviews prior to drafting funding recommendations for Council review and approval

Proposed Edits

- Create formatting consistency
- Utilize inclusive gender language
- Formalize public comment in the bylaws
- Reduce the bylaws amendment period to 28 days to increase likelihood for bylaw amendments to occur over the course of two CSC meetings
- Integrate Special/Cultural Events into the Arts and Music Application Review Committee to align with the changes to the Community Agency Funding Process
- Mirror the recent Ballot Measure OO Charter Amendment, eliminate the requirement of being a qualified elector / registered voter to serve on City Council-appointed advisory commissions and change to resident
- Change Library and Community Services Department to Community Services Division
