

Hayward's CAP & GHG Reduction Goals

2009: Council adopted Hayward's original CAP

2014: The CAP was incorporated into the City's General Plan

The updated CAP will establish actions to meet the greenhouse gas emission target for 2030 and put the City on a path to climate neutrality by 2045

30% below 2005 levels by 2025 55% below 2005 levels by 2030 Carbon neutrality by 2045



Building Energy Actions

- 1. Ordinance banning expansion of gas infrastructure and new gas appliances
- 2. Ordinance requiring energy efficiency/electrification actions at time of building retrofit
- 3. Develop electrification readiness requirements to be completed within 120 days of home sale
- 4. Ordinance requiring existing single-family homes be 100% all-electric by 2045

High Priority **▲**





Transportation Actions

- 1. Staff time or new position to pursue transportation program funding
- 2. Identify streets for permanent traffic closures
- 3. Standards for parking minimums and maximums across the City
- 4. Smart growth principles to incentivize walking, biking, public transit
- Ordinance for employers to adopt Transportation Demand Management Plans
- 6. Ordinance for e-bike and e-scooter shares/hubs
- 7. Fund active and public transit programs through local gasoline tax and/or parking fees
- 8. Gasoline/diesel car registration tax starting in 2025 with exemption criteria established for low-income residents
- 9. Transportation Network Company user tax on Uber/Lyft




Solid Waste Actions

Carbon Sequestration Actions

- 1. Bans on "problem materials"
- 2. Food service providers implement fee on single-use foodware

High Priority



- Dedicate staff time for obtaining grant funding for tree planting
- 3. Explore opportunities to fund Urban Forest Management Program (e.g. tax revenues, permit fees)

- Staff anticipates bringing a draft CAP to Council in fall 2023
