



# Homelessness in Hayward

Hayward saw a 22% decrease in homelessness from 2019 to 2022

# Efforts to Address Homelessness

- ✓ Oct. 2018      Adopted shelter crisis resolution
- ✓ Nov. 2019      Opened Hayward Navigation Center
- ✓ Jan. 2020      Adopted Strategic Roadmap with Preserve, Protect, and Produce Housing for All Priority Areas
- ✓ Mar. 2020      Adopted workplan to incentivize housing production
- ✓ June 2021      Began HEART pilot program implementation
- ✓ July 2021      Adopted Let's House Hayward Strategic Plan and Federal Stimulus Expenditure Plan
- ✓ Feb. 2023      Adopted temporary suspension of local planning and zoning requirements for homeless shelter providers on private property & Housing Element
- ✓ Feb. 2024      Declared a State of Emergency on Homelessness and adopted additional temporary local planning and zoning requirements

# Declaring a State of Emergency

Local declaration aligns with  
Alameda County Board of  
Supervisors' September 19, 2023,  
declaration

- Having a corresponding local resolution better aligns us with the County to access these resources and implement local solutions, including:
  - More effective and efficient use of funds
  - Coordination with Alameda County on streamlining land use to support affordable housing and shelter
  - Ability to support the County in requesting resources from state and federal governments
    - Flexibility for the City and partners to increase shelter and service capacity
    - Allows Council to maintain minimum health and safety standards

BOS declaration unlocks additional tools in helping expedite a sufficient response to the crisis

# St. Regis Project

- Project vision: Holistic campus of behavioral health treatment and crisis services, medical clinic, and supportive housing
  - Services will include:
    - 70 units of Permanent Supportive Housing for medically fragile and aging individuals
    - Residential treatment and recuperative care
    - On-site health care clinic
    - 24 hour on-site staffing and live-in residential management
- Staffing to include clinicians, nurses, residential counselors, care coordinators, property management, and outpatient service teams

# HEART Response Teams



## Hayward Mobile Evaluation Team (HMET)

M-F: 8am-4pm

- Acute mental health crisis
- Request for assessment of danger to self or others
- Welfare checks



## Mobile Integrated Health Unit (MIHU)

M-F: 8am-8pm

- A medical need, and
- Experiencing homeless, substance use, and/or mental health issues
- Not an active crisis



## Case Management and Mental Health Linkages (LINK)

M-F: 8:30am-6:30pm

- Receives referrals from HMET, MIHU, and the community to connect individuals to mental health and other social services support
- Ongoing follow-up and case management, as needed
- Not in an active crisis

**Response team:** Hayward Fire Department

# Homeless Response Resource Guide

- Someone is camped **around** my business/home but not on my property. Can the City move them? Who can I contact?
- Someone is camped **on** my property. Can the City move them? Who can I contact?
- Can the City arrest people who are camping on my private property?
- How can I make my property more secure from crime?
- What if someone is having a mental health crisis? How can I refer someone to services?
- Why are people experiencing homelessness allowed to loiter in public areas like the downtown and parks?
- What if I witness a crime?
- Who is responsible for the trash left **around** my private property from encampments?
- Who is responsible for the trash left **on** my private property from encampments?
- What other resources can I reach out to regarding trash or security concerns in downtown?
- As a resident or business owner, how can I help the City address homelessness?

## Teachers




Teachers engage in district-wide PD on the Science of Reading

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

- BeGLAD training for all grade levels and teachers of MLs coming soon!



# HUSD Migrant Education Program

- Help migratory children overcome educational disruption, cultural and language barriers, social isolation, various health-related problems, and other factors that may inhibit their ability to succeed in school.
- Ensure that migratory children who move between different States are not penalized by disparities in curriculum, graduation requirements, and challenging State academic standards.
- Academic and career advisement
- Leadership and higher education conferences
- Monitor graduation requirements and provide intervention strategies.
- MEP graduates achieve at higher levels than any other student groups; 86% Grad rate, 52% Meet UC/CSU requirements






# Ways to Expand Family Engagement Knowledge & Understanding
