  - Inform residents, representatives, policymakers
  - ▶ Guide City action, if any

# Guiding Principles and Foundational Priorities



- Safe, Clean, Green and Thriving supported by Fiscal Sustainability and Organizational Health serve as overarching guiding principles
- Foundation to the program is based on three priorities:
  - Maintaining our own local authority (Home Rule)
  - Preserving our revenue sources
  - Recovering our ability to engage in economic development activities.

## Public Policy Positions



- Specifically calls out policy positions pertaining to departments:
  - ▶ Public Safety
  - ▶ Transportation/Infrastructure
  - Environmental Sustainability
  - ► Finance/Human Resources
  - Community and Economic Development
- These require comment and refinement from the Mayor and Council.

# Legislative Program Coordination



- Five main levels of action coordinated by the City Manager
  - Direct lobbyists to advocate a particular stance on legislation
  - Mayoral correspondence with relevant legislators
  - Council approved resolution
  - Council outreach to legislators
  - ▶ Travel to Sacramento or Washington D.C.
- Example: 2015 DOF Redevelopment Loan Issues (interest rate determination and repayment eligibility)

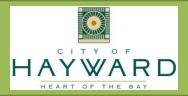


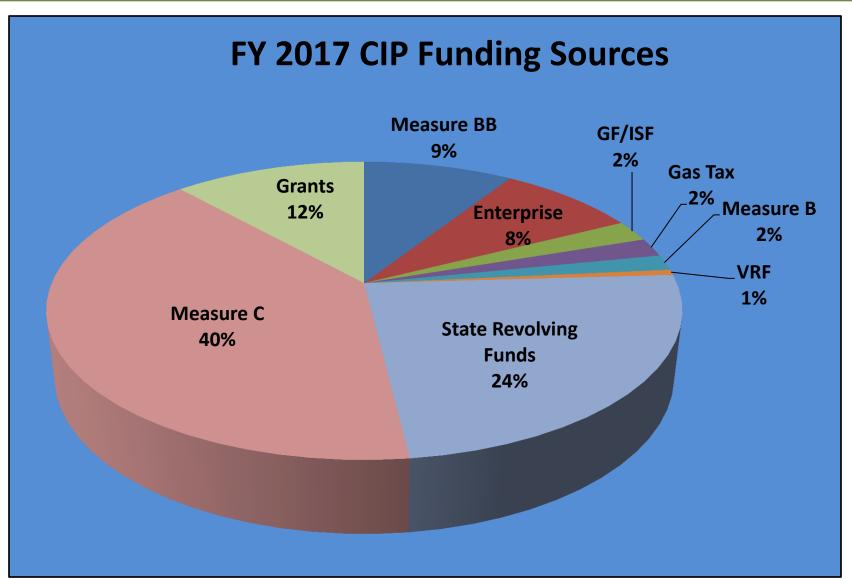

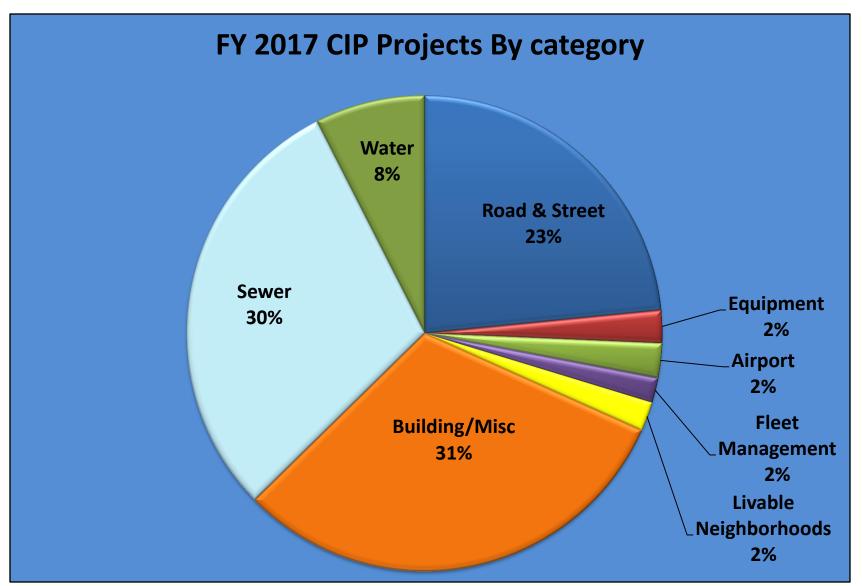
#### **OVERVIEW**

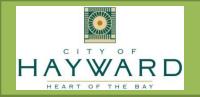
- One year planning cycle
- Over \$500M programmed FY17 FY26
- Approximately \$190 million in FY17
- Continued emphasis on Council Priorities
- Unmet needs exceed \$370 million

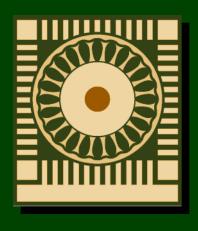
- 1. Addition of eleven parking spaces on Huntwood Avenue.
