Nonprofit's Response to COVID-19

- Continue to promote equal access to housing, prevent homelessness, and promote permanent housing conditions during the pandemic.
- Counselors are providing services remotely, and fair housing testers are investigating while physically distancing.
- Home Buyer Education classes and Fair Housing trainings and presentations have been converted to convenient, well-received, live webinars.
- ECHO Housing has developed and conducted webinars in English and Spanish with the latest information for tenants and landlords regarding COVID-19-related eviction ordinances, the Tenant Protections Act of 2019, and the most recently-passed Tenant Relief Act of 2020.
- ECHO Housing has assisted households with rental assistance grants and has stepped forward to administer the Alameda County Emergency Rental Assistance Program to prevent homelessness and stabilize housing for hundreds of households in Alameda County.



- Built a network of over 106 volunteers sewing PPE that to date have supplied 9889 pieces of PPE to nurses, hospice workers, children services, county firefighters, senior housing facilities, U.S. postal workers, homeless shelters, public schools, and an out of state Native American reservation.
- They are most proud of the volunteers who have stuck with this project, some sewing over 500 pieces of PPE. These amazing volunteers reflect the mission of the EAIC to pull diverse groups together to support our local community.
- These volunteers are multi-racial, multi-ethnic, citizens and immigrants, and cross all social-economic levels. The volunteers have donated their time, skills, and materials.
- They continue to sew for our community. This project has also been supported by a grant from East Bay Community Energy.















- The Eden Health District stepped up to help keep the Hayward Covid-19 Testing site running smoothly with a significant financial investment.
- The District distributed Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) throughout Hayward and printed Mask On posters in several languages to be posted at businesses and schools.
- The District also puts out a regular Covid-19 Breaking News Bulletin to share all the latest local, state, national, and international news.
- Just as important as these contributions is the tremendous volunteer commitment made by Eden Health District board members Pam Russo, Mariellen Faria, and Roxann Lewis who have been regularly using their medical experience to assist in the efficient operation of the Covid-19 Testing site.

- The South Hayward Parish is now teamed up with First Pres Hayward to continue to serve the South Hayward community with much-needed critical resources.
- Through the pandemic the Patrick Ave site has continued to provide food through a newly modified drive-through no-contact food pantry throughout the week, increasing from 400 families a week before the pandemic to an average of 800-1,000 families per week currently.
- Additionally, the site is now home to a winter shelter serving some of the city's most vulnerable citizens that are struggling with homelessness.
- Finally, through a partnership with Healthcare for the Homeless, the site hosts a dental van and clinical case management services for those experiencing homelessness.
- These operations continue to offer much-needed services while learning daily how to adopt and maintain current safety standards to help those in some of the greatest need.















- The Friends of Chabot College has distributed over \$340,000 in aid to students in the form of direct cash grants,
 Chromebooks, and wi-fi hotspots.
- Funds have come from a number of public and private donors including the Stupski Foundation, United Way Bay Area, Fremont Bank, the U.S. Department of Education CARES Act and Hayward Promise Neighborhood funds, the Foundation for CA Community Colleges and individual donors including Chabot College employees.
- By leveraging private donations, we were able to provide aid for over 100 undocumented and international students who do not qualify for some forms of federal aid.
- The Friends of Chabot College continues to raise emergency relief funds for students so go to www.supportchabotcollege.org and give today! Our students thank you!

- La Familia shifted resources in to better meet the economic, health, and wellness needs of individuals.
- Partner with the City of Hayward to provide a significant number of employees to the Hayward Testing Center.
- Partner on and secured additional funding to provide the Hayward Family Support Grants (\$500 cash assistance to eligible families.)
- Provide extra rent assistance and other supportive services to individuals who are re-entering the community from jail or prison.
- Adapted to Shelter In Place protocols at their FESCO housing facilities and supporting over 21 young people as they engage in distance learning.
- Increased access to counseling and case management by taking services online.
- Collaborated with other organizations whenever possible to distribute food, masks, and other essential supplies directly to individuals and their families.







- Partner with SOS Meals on Wheels in order to provide easy to-go meals for the seniors.
- Produce over **2,500** individually sealed meals each day for distribution for both home delivered and pick-up meals in most of Alameda County.
- Developed contact-free 'pick-up & go' protocol to protect the health of both staff and seniors.
- Deliver meals to residential partner sites where the meals are distributed directly to room/apartment doors.
- There has been no service interruption during the pandemic, but some of our partner location sites were forced to stop service, staff were quick to contact all clients affected, and recommended the closest available alternative















- St. Rose Hospital has cared for our community during the 2020 Pandemic, as it has since 1962 and always with respect, compassion and professionalism.
- Their administrative leadership, physicians, nurses and staff work around the clock daily to devise solutions for unprecedented questions and concerns, caring for the scared and sick, even while risking the health and safety of themselves and loved ones.
- St. Rose Hospital achieves this momentous task while being a stand alone "safety net" hospital serving southern Alameda County.
- Each and every service has remained open at St. Rose during the pandemic.
- St. Rose continues to serve ALL who come to their door for care, including those unable to pay.



COVID-19 Testing Sites

On March 23, 2020 Hayward Fire Department (HFD) established the nation's first free, city-mobilized COVID-19 drive-up testing site – just 12 days after declaration of a local emergency over the emerging global pandemic.

HFD worked diligently to partner with Hayward Police Department and several community organizations, including United Ambulance, Chabot College, and Global Support and Development and nonprofit La Familia, to support the testing site operationally.

To achieve our goal many volunteers worked side-by-side with city staff to provide this service to our community.

- 265 Volunteer Shifts Filled
- 2,552 Hours Volunteered
- 35,323 Total Test Processed










PROJECT ANALYSIS: Queue Lengths at Signal















PATRICK AVENUE FROM TENNYSON RD TO SCHAFER RD










