**BY THE NUMBERS: SUMMER 2016**

2,658 – Summer Reading books distributed  
2,475 – Summer Reading participants

**UPDATES-IN-BRIEF**

**Main Library Basement Surplus Clear Out.** The Library Operations team has begun clearing out the Main Library basement area of surplus furniture and equipment in preparation for moving to the new library next year. Broken furniture was recycled and unused task chairs were taken to surplus. The next step is to remove and recycle all of the old and surplus computers, computer screens, printers, etc. Part of the basement clean up should be finished in a couple of weeks. After the basement level area is complete, we will focus on the ground level and then the second level areas.

**General Information: Discarded Library Materials.** We've recently observed an increase in the number of patrons seeking to acquire withdrawn and discarded

library books. All withdrawn and discarded items are donated to the Friends of Hayward Library nonprofit organization.

Discarded and withdrawn library materials are never donated to individuals or organizations other than the Friends. The Friends have the final responsibility for the sale or disposal of all items donated. **“Made in Hayward” Student Library Cards.** The City of Hayward Public Library partnered with HUSD to give every Hayward student a special library card designed exclusively for “Made in Hayward” youth. All students from Kindergarten to 12th grade in a Hayward school—public charter or private—are eligible to receive this specially designed library card. The card offers the same library privileges as any other library card, but the card features an exclusive design for Hayward students. The card was introduced for a city-wide drive to register or update every Hayward student’s public library card for the library’s annual Summer Reading Challenge. To date over 3,000 of the new student cards have been issued.



**New Pilot Program: Career Online High School (COHS).** Literacy Plus has launched a pilot program to give adults the opportunity to earn an accredited high school diploma and career certificate through Career Online High School. The pilot program provides ten scholarships to qualified adult learners who are looking to expand their career opportunities, prepare for workforce entry, and continue their education. Enrollment is limited to current literacy learners in the Literacy Plus program.

Applicants must successfully complete an online self-assessment and prerequisite course, followed by an in-person interview. Once a learner is enrolled in the program, Career Online High School pairs the learner with an online academic coach, who provides the student with an individual career path, offers ongoing guidance, evaluates performance and connects the student with the resources needed to master the courses. Students are given up to 18 months to complete the program.

The program is funded through a grant from California State Library with match funding provided by the Hayward Literacy Council nonprofit organization.

**Library Construction Update.** The construction has been progressing nicely. The reinforced concrete foundation and supporting walls are nearly complete, and the steel framing work has begun. A “topping ceremony” is planned in early November, during which the final piece of steel will be ceremonially signed by guests before being installed at the top of the building. ## PROGRAM BRIEFS

**Summer Reading Challenge.** The Summer Reading Challenge in 2016 had possibly its most successful year

yet. What follows are some summary program statistics comparing this year's program and last:

In addition to SRC for kids, parallel contests targeted adult readers and City staff. The grand prize staff winner was Olga Ramirez.

**Words for Lunch Program Report.** Words for Lunch completed its second year of providing summer learning and nutrition for Hayward children and youth. The program provided nourishing lunches, literacy development activities, and book distribution to Hayward children of all ages this summer at three Hayward locations twice per week: Eden Greenway at Soto Road, Weekes Community Park, and Sunset Community Park.

Skilled community volunteers completed hours of training to hone their skills: presenting stories to diverse audiences, engaging children and parents in reading and storytelling sessions, bringing books to life by seasoning a story and asking open-ended questions to insure student comprehension and inspire a lifelong love and appreciation of reading.

What follows are some summary program statistics:

 2,003 – Meals Distributed

The program is collaboration between City of Hayward Public Library, HUSD, The Kids Breakfast Club, and other community partners. Major funding for

the program is provided by HUSD and the Kids Breakfast Club.



**Family Fun Fest.** The Family Fun Fest outdoor festival was held on Saturday, August 6 in Weekes Park. The event was the culminating celebration of the Summer Reading Challenge, and attracted over 500 attendees. Family-friendly attractions at the event included: a 30-foot-tall climbing wall, petting zoo, bounce house and bungee run donated by H.A.R.D., children's book sale provided by Friends of Hayward Library, soccer accuracy game created by the Teen Advisory Group.

Library staff provided fun crafts and activities to engage children's imaginations including: paper train wall hanging; laminated bookmarks decorated with stamps from around the world; face painting; children's book distributions; and a Pokémon Go-inspired search and scorecard game. Light refreshments were available including fresh popcorn prepared by library staff, and bottled ice tea and herbal tea donated by Honest Tea Company.

**Homework Support Center Report.** The After School Homework Center Program completed reports for the 2015-16 Academic Year. What follows are some year-end statistics:

- 2,361 – Students served (unduplicated count)
- 35,567 – Homework assignments completed
- 14,542 – Nutritious meals distributed to students
- 7,733 – Homework computer logins
- 8,476 – Total volunteer hours
- 110 – Total volunteers
- 13 – Homework tutoring sites

Hayward Library offers homework support services at twelve locations: ten at Hayward schools and two at our public libraries. On September 26, the program will open its 13th location, Mt. Eden High School.

The program was first established in 2009 with an earmark from the U.S. Department of Education, and now is funded through a partnership between the City of Hayward Public Library, HUSD, Chabot College, and Cal State East Bay. Additional support is provided by Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

**Literacy Plus Program Report.** The Literacy Plus Program completed reports for the 2015-16 Fiscal Year. What follows are some year-end statistics:

- 127 – Adult Literacy learners in program
- 272 – Adult ESL learners in program
- 138 – Volunteer tutors
- 6,415 – Volunteer hours (Literacy and)
- 2,304 – Early Learning for Families (ELF) backpack circulations
- 2,157 – ELF children's books distributed
- 391 – Families for Literacy program participants

Literacy Plus is a City of Hayward Public Library program, staffed and funded in the Library and Community Services Department operating budget since 1985. Additional funding support is provided through grants from California State Library and the fundraising efforts of the Hayward Literacy Council nonprofit organization.
